conflict of interest and effective meetings. The \$75 fee includes the MSUE Citizen Planner Certificate

Planner credential (see below). Complete the entire course in three days! To earn the certificate of
completion, you must attend all sessions denoted with a diamond on the Conference at a Glance pages.

The Master Citizen Planner Credentialing Program

This year all sessions (except the Citizen Planner Program sessions) are designated for Master Citizen Planner Continuing Education Credits. The Master Citizen Planner (MCP) credentialing program was developed to provide advanced skill development and a benchmark for continuing education among Michigan elected and appointed officials and citizen volunteers. The MCP program involves completing the Citizen Planner course of core sessions, passing an online examination, finishing a capstone project, and completing a minimum of six continuing education credit hours every year.


Opening Session: Optimism and Leadership | 1 AICP CM




